You can vote if you are a Maryland resident, a U.S. citizen, and 18 years old by the next General Election. You cannot be under guardianship or disqualified by a criminal record.

**To register to vote**, you can fill out and turn in a Voter Registration application in person at a Board of Elections office, any office of the State Department of Health, Social Services Administration, Motor Vehicle Administration, Office on Aging, and all public institutions of higher education as well as other State Agencies. You should take your valid photo identification card or a bank statement with your name and address to prove who you are. If you prefer, you can take the Voter Registration application home with you to complete and mail it to a local or State Board of Elections office. If you choose to do this, you will need to bring a valid photo ID or a bank statement or utility bill with your name and address on it to your local polling place the first time you vote.

**Once you receive your Voter Notification Card from your local Board of Elections, you are officially registered to vote.** It will have your name on it as well as the precinct number and polling place where you will need to go on voting days to cast your vote.

**When you go to vote** at your polling place on the day of an election, you will check in with an election judge and your name should appear on their roster to vote in that location. Once you check in, the election judge will tell you which station to go to so you can cast your vote. Let the election judge know if you need assistance, and they can help you.

You will **never have to register again** as long as you continue to live in the same jurisdiction keep your name and address current with your local Board of Elections, and vote. If you change your name or address, you must notify the Board of Elections office where you live by submitting a change of address form or completing a new Voter Registration application.
